# Simple T-Shirt

This simple t-shirt fits many of the twelfth scale dolls, but with some simple adjustments it will fit even more. Originally I made this for RealPuki, but it also fits PukiPuki and with neck enlargement, it will fit Lil'pOtbellies by Charles' Creature Cabinet. With such a simple design, you can easily enlarge or shrink to suit your needs.

### **Materials**

Jersey
Thread to match
Three buttons/beads or two snaps

## **Tools**

- \*Scissors
- \*Sewing needle

- \*When making miniature clothing you want to eliminate bulk wherever possible. Seam allowances are minuscule, 2-3mm, hems are single fold and only 3-5mm. (except where using elastic) Follow the markings on each pattern piece.
- \*Be sure to use some kind of fray stop on your silk or any other fabric that frays easily.
- \*I have hand stitched all of these projects and there are stitch guides at the end of this pattern.
- \*I prefer to use all purpose thread for my embroidery, but a single strand of 6 strand floss will work.
- \*Optional tools that may make the process easier are: crochet hooks for turning and wooden dowels for pressing. A straw used in conjunction with a dowel or chop stick for turning.

# **Cutting out your Pattern**

Trace your pattern onto the wrong side of your fabric. You may want to print the pattern page on card stock to make this easier.





Cut out each piece inside the traced lines, not outside.

Stitch the shoulder seam using a back stitch, from the edge to the red dot, (A to B), and repeat for the other side. I have two photos of this for clarity. (The seams were stitched with contrasting thread for visibility.)





Hem your neck edge pulling the center front edge down in a smile curve. This will produce a rounded neck opening. The hem goes from 2mm at the shoulder seam to 3mm in the center.



Sew your side seams from the bottom to the red dot, ( D to C ). Turn back the edge of the arm hole and hem. This hem will be 3mm at the shoulder and only 2mm at the side seam.



Hem the back opening folding the edge to the inside on the green line. repeat for the other side.




Hem the bottom edge, ( 3mm ), and add your closures.



I used button loops with 4mm buttons, but in the interest of simplicity, you can use snaps. Or in a pinch, just pin it.




## **Stitch Guides**



### **Running Stitch**


Insert your needle down at 1 and come back out at 2.

2 becomes 1 and you repeat.




#### **Back Stitch:**

- \*Bring your needle up at 1
- \*Insert your needle down at 2, bringing the tip back up at 3.
- \*3 becomes 1 and repeat.




#### **Blanket Stitch:**

- \*Anchor your thread on the back coming out at 1
- \*Insert your needle down at 2 coming out at 3, with the working thread behind your needle.
- \*3 becomes 1, and repeat



**Button Loop:** Create a loop at the edge of your dress opening that will fit over your button. Stitch over the loop, covering it using the blanket stitch.




#### **Chain Stitch:**


- \*Bring the needle up at 1.
- \*Insert the needle again at 1, and bring the needle tip up at 2, with the working thread behind the needle, and pull the needle through the loop.
- \* Repeat, anchoring with a small stitch at the end.


# **Hem Stitch**



**Whip Stitch** 








# Lazy Daisy:

- \*Bring the needle up at 1.
- \*Insert the needle again at 1, and bring the needle tip up at 2, with the working thread behind the needle, and pull the needle through the loop.
- \* Anchoring with a small stitch at 3.
- \* Repeat for chosen design
